There are two types of admissions exams for college:

General Reasoning Tests: ACT and SAT

Required for admission at most colleges

SAT Subject Tests

Required for admission at the most selective colleges.

Standardized exams are offered multiple times each year:

- The ACT is offered six times each year.
 - February, April, June, September, October, December
- The SAT is offered seven times each year.
 - 2016-2017: January, March, May, June, October, November, December
 - 2017-2018: March, May, June, August, October, November, December
- The PSAT is offered in October.
 - "Wednesday" administration (primary administration) and "Saturday" administration.
 - A student can only sit for one of the administrations.

Goal: Complete the standardized testing process by the end of junior year.

Identifying a Fixed Mindset



How not to choose between the tests

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Manage the process!



WHAT DETERMINES STUDENTS' DEMONSTRATED INTEREST?

- Interaction and inquiry card submission (or scan) at college fairs
- Campus visit during junior year or summer after junior year
- Early application
- Supplemental Essay showing your particular interest in that college and how you have researched it specifically
- Speaking with alumni or students who may share information with students on behalf of admission office

- Campus information session/ tour
- Interview with admission rep/ alum
- Second visit to campus in senior year
- Overnight program
- Contacting admission rep
- Meeting with faculty on campus or by phone





- Baylor: "we seek those who can gain the most from a Baylor experience, for students with a demonstrated interest in becoming a 'Baylor Bear'."
- Carnegie Mellon: "Admission Interviews are a great supplement to an information session and tour of campus, and allow a prospective student to get a personalized introduction to campus and the unique world-class education offered at Carnegie Mellon. An admission decision will not be based off of this interview; it is looked upon as demonstrated interest in the application process."
- Stanford: "We offer campus tours and information sessions to provide you with the information you need to make an informed college choice, not to evaluate you. And we welcome calls and emails for the same reason. Please do not feel compelled to contact us to demonstrate your interest in Stanford; we know by the very fact of your applying that you are seriously interested in Stanford. We don't keep records of prospective student contacts with our office."

Rhodes College: "Your overall campus visit indicates demonstrated interest and will play a
considerable role in the admissions decision-making process."

Google: "Common data set" - UCLA

- Duke: "Duke does not take demonstrated interest into account when evaluating applications. Although we are glad that you may have visited our campus or asked us questions about the school, demonstrated interest is not an advantage in the
- <u>Dartmouth</u>: "Personal contact is not tracked during the admissions process. Demonstrated interest is not considered when making decisions."
